This is a very well written comprehensive review about alterations of saliva and gut microbiome in patients with liver cirrhosis. The manuscripts summarises the studies, describes relations between degree of liver damage and change of microbiota. The data build the bridge to special hepatic complications such as HE, SBP or HCC. Therapeutic



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implications are indicated. I don't have further comments and suggest a publication of the manuscript.

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
