Interesting review of this rare pathology, congratulations. I would like to make some small considerations. Page 7. Clinical presentation: "The usual presentations include GI bleeding (hematemesis, melena, and hematochezia) (68%), diarrhea (52%), abdominal pain (40%), abdominal distension (12%), dysphagia (8%) and vomiting". It is described



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in the text and in table 2. It should be reduced in the text, since it already appears in table 2. Page 11: Conclusion: The following statement is not well understood: “SJS or TEN is not uncommonly associated with GI complications”

The authors are to be commended for having many cases of SJS with gastrointestinal involvement. As pointed out in the discussion, the current literature is limited. So this study would contribute to this field. Manuscript is well written and clear in their aims and findings. I am not sure what that means: Page 11: Conclusion: The following



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statement is not well understood: “SJS or TEN is not uncommonly associated with GI complications, which may be delayed”
