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Proctography is reserved for patients with suspected prolapse. Stool cultures, **blood tests** (full blood count, C-reactive protein), and rectal biopsy are necessary only if the history suggests incontinence is due to diarrhoea; otherwise they are not routinely requested. Anal manometry gives an objective assessment of anal continence.

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electromyography—a **test** that checks how well the muscles and nerves of your anus and pelvic floor are working; Endoscopy. Your doctor may perform an endoscopy to look inside your anus, rectum, and colon for signs of inflammation and digestive tract problems that may be causing your fecal incontinence.

Fecal Incontinence

Also known as: soiling

Inability to control the passage of gas or stools through the anus.

Common causes

Fecal incontinence is not always related to an underlying condition. It may be caused by:

- Constipation
- Diarrhea
- Scarred or stiffened rectal walls
- Surgery complications
- Vaginal child birth
- Mental retardation

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Approach. Faecal incontinence is a symptom, and the cause is often multifactorial. A structured approach to management is required, beginning with diagnosis and correction of reversible contributing factors. A baseline assessment should include history, examination, and **anoscopy/sigmoidoscopy**. A cognitive assessment may also be appropriate if learning difficulties, dementia, or behavioural issues are ...

Your doctor will ask questions about your condition and perform a physical exam that usually includes a visual inspection of your anus. A probe may be used to examine this area for nerve damage. Normally, this touching causes your anal sphincter to contract and your anus to pucker.

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Treatment

Self-treatment: Self-care steps that may be helpful in some less-serious cases:

- Regular exercise, consumption of high-fiber diet & plenty of fluids to prevent constipation
- Avoid straining while passing stools
- Adopt a sitting or squatting position to avoid straining

See a doctor if you notice:

- It after vaginal child birth
- It interferes with daily activities at home or workplace
- Social withdrawal or low self-esteem issues
- Difficulties in interpersonal relationships
- It in a patient having some other conditions like diabetes, infections, multiple sclerosis

See a doctor immediately if you notice:

- It occurs suddenly
- It following a head injury or accident
- It in children above the age of 3 years
- Pain while passing stools
