The abstract summarizes well the case described in the manuscript. The key words reflect the real focus of the manuscript. The background adequately describes the significance of the study and it highlighted its focus well. It is a case report and Informed written consent was not necessary according to their Institutional Review Board (IRB). The manuscript interprets the findings adequately and it highlighted the key points clearly. The discussion was accurate and it discussed the paper's relevance to clinical practice well. The manuscript cited appropriately the latest references in the introduction and discussion sections. Twenty-two percent had less than 3 years. The author didn't self-cite or omit, incorrectly cite and/or over-cite references. The manuscript was well, concisely and coherently organized and its style, language and grammar were accurate and appropriate. The manuscript met the requirements of ethics and was accepted by IRB. Although this is not an experiment, the importance of this case report lies in the severity of the complication of treatment presented by the patient. It is important to report the case so that other professionals can recognize this possibility and start treatment early.
