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Vesical varices may occur in patients with portal hypertension in circumstances where the normal splanchnic collaterals fail to develop due to prior obliteration from treatments such as surgery, sclerotherapy or ligation. The second probability is when the anatomy of the venous drainage of the bladder is altered from surgery such as bladder augmentation with a bowel segment.
