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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

This literature reported a case of phlegmonous gastritis. Unlike typical PG findings, most were covered with necrotic tissue, in which gram-positive bacilli were found. Infiltration of inflammatory cells by lymphocytes but not neutrophils was partly observed. The clinical reference is that when PG is highly suspected in the clinic, but gastroscopy is performed and then the pathological biopsy does not prove neutrophil cell infiltration, PG can still be diagnosed and anti-infective treatment, which has certain clinical value.
