The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; (3) Format: There is 1 figure; (4) References: A total of 37 references are cited, including 8 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are 6 self-cited references. The self-referencing rates should be less than 10%. Please keep the reasonable self-citations (i.e. those that are most closely related to the topic of the manuscript) and remove all other improper self-citations. If the authors fail to address the critical issue of self-citation, the editing process of this manuscript will be terminated. 2 Language evaluation: Classification: Grade A and Grade A. 3 Academic norms and rules: No academic misconduct was found in the Bing search. 4 Supplementary comments: This is an invited manuscript. No financial support was obtained for the study. The topic has not previously been published in the WJCCM. 5 Issues raised: The authors did not provide original pictures. Please provide the original figure documents.
