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Science Editor: 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes the relationship between gut microbiota and body composition in cirrhotic patients. The topic is within the scope of the WJG. (1) Classification: Grade C and Grade D; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: The authors found that change in gut microbioma in cirrhotic patients is associated with change in body composition, however this interaction is not explained nor discussed. A comparison with a control group without cirrhosis should be implemented. In addition different type of cirrhosis in the patients' population should be described. The results should be presented more clearly and the discussion better organized and shortened. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; (3) Format: There are 4 tables and 5 figures; (4) References: A total of 45 references are cited, including 24 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are 3 self-cited references. The self-referencing rate should be less than 10%. Please keep the reasonable self-citations (i.e. those which are most closely related to the topic of the manuscript) and remove all other improper self-citations. If the authors fail to address the critical issue of self-citation, the editing process of this manuscript will be terminated; (6) References recommendations: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by the peer reviewer(s), especially those published by the peer reviewer(s) him/herself (themselves). If the authors find the peer reviewer(s) request for the authors to cite improper references
