Manuscript Number: 71317 Title: Personality traits and self-harm behaviors in Chinese children and adolescents: the mediation of psychological resilience The manuscript describes results from a study using univariate and multivariate Logistic regression to identify possible factors associated to self-harm in adolescents and analyze the relationship between personality traits and self-harm, as well as the possible mediation via resilience in this relationship. The sample consisted of 4780 children and adolescents in southwestern China. Data analysis considered: general characteristics, SH behavior, psychological resilience, personality traits, depression and anxiety, based on self-reporting questionnaires. I consider the subject of this work to be of great relevance today and suitable for the WJP, as the method adopted was adequate for the objectives of the study, in addition to being very well described. The conclusions are consistent with the results. I consider this article suitable for publication in WJP, after revisions in the text. The authors present a Table 2, which is not mentioned in the text. Page 4, paragraph 2, line 10: "extraversion" or "introversion" scores? Page 9, paragraph 2, line 5: Model (capitalize the first letter to standardize)... Page 10, paragraph 1, line 7: Figure 1 (space). Page 10, paragraph 2, line 2: better to change "among" by "in". Page 10, paragraph 2, line 3: "The analysis results showed" or "The analysis of the results showed"?

The paper is very good, well written and the sample under study has a considerable figure, permitting to reach valid statistical results. I would suggest some cross-cultural comparisons with other similar studies focused of self-harm behavior among other populations (rather than Chinese, obviously). This is superficially done in the introduction; maybe you'll add value to your set of data as handed in, while comparing figures closely with other authors'. Very few grammatical editing is needed (for example ref. 18: adolescents'self...).
