Cellular Treatments for Unresectable HCC

Abstract

Hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC) is the most common primary malignancy of the liver and is unfortunately associated with an overall poor prognosis and high mortality. Early and intermediate stages of HCC allow for treatment with surgical resection, ablation and even liver transplantation, however disease progression warrants conventional systemic therapy. For years treatment options were limited to molecular-targeting medications, of which sorafenib remains the standard of care. The recent development and success of immune checkpoint inhibitors has proven to be a breakthrough in the treatment of HCC, but there is an urgent need for the development

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TAE is the most widely used primary treatment for hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC) not amenable to curative treatment by excision or ablation. Most of the blood supply to the normal liver parenchyma comes from the portal vein, whereas blood flow to the tumor comes mainly from the hepatic artery.

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CAR-T cell therapy, in particular, has been a very successful novel method of treating CD19-positive hematological malignancies, and its application has recently been considered in the treatment of solid tumors, including HCC. 33 Currently, there are no clinical trials investigating **CAR-T cell** therapy for HCC, as there have been many concerns about the drug causing cytokine-release syndrome, which affects ...
