
b. **Query:** Can you comment on what would lead you to believe this is happening vs ileus from appendicitis or the level of pain/WBC, etc? Is it the degree of SBO (like Figure 1) that provides the major insight?

Reply : Thank you for the query. The patient presented with symptoms suggesting of intestinal obstruction (pain abdomen, abdominal distension, vomiting and obstipation). On abdominal examination, it was distended, with **visible bowel loops remarkably in the center abdomen** and peritonitic, especially in the right iliac fossa, with **exaggerated bowel sound**. The **increased WBC count and X-Ray abdomen with multiple air fluid levels** clinched to the diagnosis of mechanical small bowel obstruction, but the cause was indetermined preoperatively (other investigation i.e CECT Abdomen was not done as the patient was too poor to afford it).
