Science Editor: 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes a review of the single-fraction stereotactic ablative body radiation therapy for primary and metastasic lung tumor. The topic is within the scope of the WJCO. (1) Classification: Grade A and Grade B; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: This review regarding the single fraction radiotherapy in the treatment of primary and metastatic lung cancer is very interesting and of current importance, especially in times of the COVID pandemic. It is well written. However, some improvements should be made in the presentation of the studies in order not to be redundant. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; and (3) Format: There are 5 tables. (4) References: A total of 83 references are cited, including 20 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are 5 self-cited references. The self-referencing rates should be less than 10%. Please keep the reasonable self-citations that are closely related to the topic of the manuscript, and remove other improper self-citations. If the authors fail to address the critical issue of self-citation, the editing process of this manuscript will be terminated; and (6) References recommend: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by peer reviewer(s), especially the references published by the peer reviewer(s) themselves.
