The topic is within the scope of the WJG. (1) Classification: Grade C and Grade D; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: Reviewer 05304884 think that authors need to change the indicators for evaluate the NAFLD and NASH. (3) Format: There are 3 tables and 7 figures; (4) References: A total of 23 references are cited, including 4 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There is no self-cited reference. 2 Language evaluation: Classification: Grade A and Grade B. A language editing certificate was not provided because the authors are most likely native speakers of English. 3 Academic norms and rules: The authors provided the Biostatistics Review Certificate and the Institutional Review Board Approval Form. The signed Conflict-of-Interest Disclosure Form and Copyright License Agreement were not provided. Please, provide the signed Conflict-of-Interest Disclosure Form and Copyright License Agreement. No academic misconduct was found by the Google search. An abstract of this study was presented at the International Liver Congress 2019 and published in the proceedings of that Congress. 4 Supplementary comments: This is an invited manuscript. The study was supported by European association for the study of the liver and National Institute of Health Research (NIHR) Biomedical Research Centre. The topic has not previously
