(1) However, in discussing thrombotic events associated with cancer, not only TMA and VOD but also disseminated intravascular coagulation (DIC) should be referred. DIC is a well-known hypercoagulation state which can be caused by malignancy including gastric cancer, and very critical condition. Authors wrote "thrombotic event might be one of the initial presentations of occult malignancy", however, they didn't show any previous reported cases.

Answer: Thank you very much. It has been revised as suggested.

Disseminated intravascular coagulation (DIC) is a well-known hypercoagulation state which can be caused by malignancy including gastric cancer, and very critical condition.^[4] DIC or other thrombotic event are the initial presentation of gastric cancer.^[5]
