COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

This is an interesting study which focuses on an important topic for surgical literature as the definition of anastomotic leak in colorectal surgery. The study is well written and the analysis of data is well conducted, as well as the discussion of the results. I have some comments, which I report below. MAJOR comment There might be a bias in the selection of surgeons interviewed. In The Netherlands, 141 surgeons from the Taskforce of Coloproctology of the Dutch Society of Gastrointestinal surgery were invited. This suggest that these surgeons might be highly specialized colorectal surgeons with academic interest, potentially engaged in writing national guidelines and perhaps good readers of the scientific literature. On the other side, an unknown number of Chinese surgeons was invited and the first 200 replies were considered (rather than considering all replies in an a given time interval). These surgeons were registered as gastrointestinal surgeons, which not necessarily implies they are specialized in colorectal surgery (they might be upper gi surgeons or even hpb surgeons). The two populations of



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surgeons should be presented according to: - Their background (academic OR not academic) - Number of colorectal procedures performed annually - Their attitude to read scientific literature. All these three characteristic might strongly influence their responses to the questionnaire. If the two populations are not comparable, so their answers are not comparable. Please, if you have, provide information about this pivotal point. MINOR comments: - The invitation letter and instructions to fill the questionnaire should be included in the supplementary materials - With regards to clinical manifestations predictive of CAL, the use of parameters derived from the Dutch Leakage Score might have led to reach a greater agreement between Dutch surgeons compared to Chinese colleagues - The fact that 40% of Chinese surgeons interviewed expressed disagreement about high levels of CRP as predictive of CAL is indeed interesting. This might be the spy of different usage of this laboratory test and this question should have been preceded by the question: Do you routinely use CRP?
