

Response to reviewer's comments:

Reviewer # 503623 comment:

The manuscript reports the results of studies on transitional care from pediatric to adult gastroenterologist in inflammatory bowel disease as experienced in Quebec, Canada. The study was conducted by assessment of the survey among 136 health care professionals involved in caring for IBD patients. The findings revealed that the pediatric patients were inadequately prepared for the transition, thus indicating the importance of an educational program for young adults with IBD. This is a reasonable paper, well written, and although not that scientific could offer a reasonable reading to those dealing with the health system similar to that in Quebec.

Response: No specific issue addressed by this reviewer. We acknowledge the fact that despite the fact that this study was based in Quebec that there are likely other health care systems facing similar issues and our results are unlikely unique to our system. It reinforces the importance of collaboration by the different health care professionals.

Transition programs to support pediatric patients who are getting ready to transition to adult healthcare are not frequently used in hospitals. In the presented article the authors aimed to determine the tools needed and problems encountered the transition of IBD patients from pediatric to adult gastroenterologist. Although the percentage of respondents is low, the majority of them believed that a standardized structure is important for a successful transition. The article needs minor language polishing: Introduction, 3.paragraph, the first sentence; Their remains.. must be "There remain or It remains"?
