General comment This is an interesting paper raising only minor comments. This study shows the data of patients seen in a tertiary center. It is possible that different results would be obtained in the GP practice or in non university hospitals. This point needs to be indicated in the title. Among the predictors for healthcare seeking, the authors looked at the impact of frequent colonoscopies. this is pertinent but was frequent defined as more than 2 colonoscopies per year? Indeed the mean number of coloscopies was < 2. Does frequent mean more than 2 colonoscopies during the course of the disease? Please clarify.
