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Background: Chills, high fever, right **upper abdomen pain**, and increased white **blood cell** count are the main and common clinical features of **bacterial liver abscess**. It is rare to see **bacterial liver abscess** present **symptoms of myocardial injury** first, and this can **lead to misdiagnosis**.

BACKGROUND

Acute chest pain (ACP) is very common among patients turning to emergency departments. Nevertheless, ACP caused by esophageal foreign body is relatively rarely reported.

CASE SUMMARY

A 56-year-old man suffering from chest pain (increased pain for the last 9 h) was admitted at our hospital on October 25th, 2015. After undergoing physical examination and laboratory blood testing he was diagnosed with acute anterior myocardial infarction. Consequently, the patient underwent emergency percutaneous coronary angiography; however, no myocardial infarction signs were observed. Later on, the patient experienced respiration failure and therefore was transferred to Intensive care Unit (ICU). Cardiac ultrasound showed pericardial effusion, which was considered as the cause of shock. He then underwent pericardium puncture drainage and the circulation
