Re: Manuscript entitled “Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and Gastrointestinal Morbidity in a Large Cohort of Young Adults”

Dear Editor,

We appreciate the thorough peer review of the above-referenced manuscript as well as the comments and questions offered by the reviewer. We are delighted the reviewer thought it is a well-written paper with valid and noteworthy take home messages, and thank you for giving us the opportunity to revise and resubmit it. In the revised draft, we have addressed all the reviewer’s comments and questions as well as all comments from the science editor. Listed below are the reviewer’s and science editor’s comments, followed by our responses point by point.

Reviewer’s comments	Authors’ response
The authors cite a higher prevalence of psychiatric co-morbidities in patients with ADHD in the discussion. Could the authors comment on whether psychiatric co-morbidities were highly prevalent in their cohort of patients? Did the prevalence of mood disorders etc. vary in those with FGIDs?	We thank the reviewer for this comment. Unfortunately, since young adults with major psychiatric illnesses are not eligible for recruitment to the IDF, we were not able to study the association between FGID and major psychiatric comorbidities in our cohort. We do think that the stress related to serving in the army may contribute to the GI-associated comorbidity in young adults with ADHD and

	we added this response to the discussion section.
This may be relevant to the etiology/pathophysiology of FGIDs in ADHD and have therapeutic implications. FGIDs are now considered disorders of gut-brain interaction and centrally acting neuromodulators are amongst the mainstays of refractory FGIDs and may therefore have a role in treating those with ADHD - I think this could be included in the discussion.	We thank the reviewer for this important message. We have a paragraph in the discussion beginning with: "The association between ADHD and GI-related functional morbidity may affect clinical decisions". We have changed it to "... clinical decisions and treatment" and added this point to the end of this paragraph.

The authors need to update the references.	We did a new literature search and added 3 relevant new references, 2 of them discussing a new paradigm of gut microbiota and ADHD, which was added to the discussion.
