Tertiary peritonitis: Tertiary peritonitis is caused by the bacterium *Mycobacterium tuberculosis* (TB), and is referred to as tuberculosis peritonitis. Chemical peritonitis (also termed sterile peritonitis): Chemical peritonitis is caused by leakage of sterile fluids that are irritants to the peritoneum; for example, bile, blood, or barium used as a contrast agent during procedures and tests.

Medical Condition

Inflammation of peritonium, the membrane that lines the inner abdominal wall and encloses organs within the abdomen.

- Common (More than 200,000 cases per year in US)
- Requires lab test or imaging
- Treatment from medical professional advised
- Can last several days or weeks

Peritonitis commonly occurs due to bacterial infection following any rupture (perforation) in the abdomen, colon, appendix or as a complication of other medical conditions. Symptoms include abdominal distension, bloating, fever, nausea and vomiting and loss of appetite. Treatment includes antibiotics and may involve surgery.

Intra-abdominal infections can be classified into uncomplicated or complicated (peritonitis). Peritonitis is divided into primary, secondary, and tertiary. Tertiary peritonitis is the less common but the most severe among peritonitis stratifications, being defined as a recurrent intra-abdominal infection that occurs 48 h after a well-succeeded control of a secondary peritonitis. This disease has a complex pathogenesis that is closely related to the capacity of the peritoneal cavity to activate immunological processes. Patients who progress to persistent peritonitis are at an increased risk of developing renal infections, septicemia, and multiple organ failure.
