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Science Editor: 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes a Case Report of the Acquired coagulation dysfunction resulting from rheumatoid arthritis. The topic is within the scope of the WJCC. (1) Classification: Grade C; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: The authors in this case study reported a novel finding. The clinician should take into consideration investigating vitamin K deficiencies in RA cases. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; (3) Format: There are 3 tables and 1 figure; (4) References: A total of 14 references are cited, including 1 reference published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There is no self-cited reference. 2 Language evaluation: Classification: Grade C. 3 Academic norms and rules: The authors provided the Written informed consent and CARE Checklist (2016). No academic misconduct was found in the Bing search. 4 Supplementary comments: This is an unsolicited manuscript. The study was supported by the National Natural Science Foundation of China. The topic has not previously been published in the WJCC. 5 Issues raised:(1) The language classification is Grade C.
