SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

This is an interesting and well-described case. I suggest to highlight in the discussion the role of small bowel endoscopy and imaging (MRI, capsule endoscopy and enteroscopy) in the follow-up of patients with known PJS. I think that the described case has never underwent small bowel examination before the occurrence of acute symptoms. This concept should be stressed.
