Science Editor: 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes a basic study of the high doses of catecholamines activate glucose transport in human adipocytes independently from adrenoceptor stimulation or vanadium addition. The topic is within the scope of the WJD. (1) Classification: Grade B and Grade C; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: The authors investigated adrenalin and noradrenalin stimulation on glucose transport as 2-DG uptake with and without vanadium in both of rodents (mouse or rat) and human adipocytes. However, the introduction and discussion were too much redundant, which need more concise expression. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; and (3) Format: There is 1 table and 7 figures. (4) References: A total of 62 references are cited, including 6 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are 25 self-cited references. The self-referencing rates should be less than 10%. Please keep the reasonable self-citations that are closely related to the topic of the manuscript, and remove other improper self-citations. If the authors fail to address the critical issue of self-citation, the editing process of this manuscript will be terminated; and (6) References recommend: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by peer reviewer(s), especially the references published by the peer reviewer(s) themselves.
