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## Editorial Office's Comments

Science Editor: Dear Lia Ma, The manuscript of Xia et al. describes the potential relationship of long noncoding RNAs with the osteogenic and adipogenic differentiation process of mesenchymal stem cells. Also, the manuscript descibes the role of the long non coding RNAs in the pathogenesis of degenerative bone diseases. However, in the main text, only the role of long non coding RNAs in MSCs differentiation process was in detail descibed. Only a small part (3.3 Involvement of lncRNAs in osteoarthritis through histone modifications) described the potential role of these RNAs in osteoarthritis. This section should be a seperate section from the 3. Histone Modifications, and should be stated as a new section (e.g. 4. Role of lnRNAs in bone degenerative diseases.). In this way, degenerative bone diseases such as osteoarthritis, spinal ostearthritis and cartilage damage and their potential relation with the long non coding RNAs should be presented. In addition, and based to the criteria of MSCs as has been outlined by the ISCT (Mesenchymal stem versus stromal cells: International Society for Cellular Therapy Mesenchymal Stromal Cell committee position statement on nomenclature. (Cytotherapy. 2019 Sept 13; DOI: https://doi.org/10.1016/j.jcyt.2019.08.002 and Minimal criteria for defining multipotent mesenchymal stromal cells. The International Society for Cellular Therapy position statement (Cytotherapy 2006, 8(4): 315-317) the acronym of MSCs refers to Mesenchymal Stromal Cells and not to Mesenchymal Stem

The properties of MSCs should be clearly presented in the introduction section of the manuscript, as described in the above references.
