Acronyms/abbreviations

Explanation

Acronyms/abbreviations enhance flow and readability; however, they must be defined correctly and used consistently throughout an article. Defining and re-defining acronyms should be strictly avoided, as should abandoning their use after they are defined, not defining them at all, and/or using them inconsistently. Attentive journal reviewers and editors are particularly sensitive to this. Moreover, most, if not all, journals explicitly address and mandate proper acronym use in their instructions to authors.

See edited file. Note where the acronyms “PH”, “DLCO”, “FEV₁”, FVC”, “RV” and “TLC”, among several others, were defined (at FIRST appearance, and only once) and used *consistently* throughout the article.
