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1 Scientific quality: The manuscript for pancreaticobiliary cancer is a basic study for evaluating the efficacy of the duodenal microbiota for diagnosing PB Ca. The combination of Clostridium cluster XVIII and CA19-9 levels showed 91.7% sensitivity and 71.4% specificity for diagnosing PB Ca. The topic is within the scope of the WJG. (1) Classification: Grade C (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: Authors reported the correlation between the human microbiota and malignant gastrointestinal diseases and investigated the efficacy of the duodenal microbiota for diagnosing pancreaticobiliary cancers. The results showed that the combining Clostridium cluster XVIII and CA19-9 levels were 91.7% sensitivity and 71.4% specificity for pancreaticobiliary cancer diagnosis. However, the authors should screen to more cases to confirm the clinical values of Clostridium cluster XVIII compared with CA19-9 levels; Figure 2 and Figure 4 should be deleted. (3) Format: There are 7 tables and 4 figures. There are some capitalization errors in Table 1. Additionally, authors should provide the abbreviations in Table 6. (4) References: A total of 67 references are cited, including 10 references published in the last 3 years (2018 - now ). (5) Self-cited references: There is no self-cited references. References recommendations: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by the peer reviewer(s), especially those published by the peer reviewer(s) him/herself (themselves). Reviewer gave the Grade C only.
