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Classification: Grade D; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: The present paper aimed at review the state of art in split liver transplantation with full right/left hemi-liver grafts (SPLT) for two adult recipients. The topic is surely of interest. However, the Authors failed to critically and pragmatically report the actual results of this surgical strategy or to discuss the complexity of its implementation. The paper is a narrative overview with unspecific information and very low data granularity. The biggest clinical issue with SPLT in the majority of cases is small for size syndrome after transplantation, due to either insufficient graft volumetry and/or low graft quality. The present paper does not appropriately address this issue, and most importantly does not discuss the technology advances which might help improving the outcome, i.e., machine perfusion. 2 Language quality: Classification: Grade B. 3 Recommendation: Rejection. 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes a minireview of the emerging role of colorectal mucus. The topic is within the scope of the WJG. (1) Classification: Grade C; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: This is an interesting mini-review. In this paper, the authors have summarized the emerging role of non-invasive colorectal mucus sampling in the diagnosis of intestinal diseases, which may provide a new sight in our approach to the investigation and diagnosis of colorectal diseases in the future; and (3) Format: There are no tables or figures. (4) References: A total of 2 references are cited, including 13 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references:



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There are 4 self-cited references. The self-referencing rates should be less than 10%.
