The manuscript points to a coinfection or superinfection between the microorganisms Pneumocystis and Legionella in a patient receiving CHOP treatment. There are 2 cases reported in the literature as mentioned. In my opinion, the authors could have worked better on the clinical case in question, they should report the value of pancreatic enzymes and also how the diagnosis of pancreatitis was elucidated (after all, it could be a medicated pancreatitis). They could also better explain the time spent in the intensive care unit (ICU), ward, possible complications of using CHOP. In general the term is relevant and the case is very rich and can be better clarified
