	The author aimed to investigate the expression of adipokine ghrelin	
	and ghrelin receptor in human colorectal adenoma and adjacent	
	colorectal tissue. Ghrelin is an adipokine important in metabolism	
	and energy balance, and with the rise in obesity and metabolic	
	syndrome incidence and prevalence the disruption in adipokine

2	that ghrelin and ghrelin receptor are expressed in human colorectal	[Y]
	adenoma and adjacent tissue with ghrelin expression being more
