Science Editor: 1 Scientific quality: The manuscript describes that routine use of prophylactic clipping does not reduce the risk of post-procedural delayed adverse events overall, and additional effectiveness and cost-effectiveness researches are needed in patients with proximal lesions≥20 mm, in whom prophylactic clipping may be useful. The preventive process significantly decreases the risk of delayed adverse events (DB and DP) by more than 80%. The topic is within the World Journal of Gastrointestinal Oncology. (1) Classification: Grade C and Grade D; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Reports: The author is well documented about some shortcomings of the prevention of DB and DP with coverage agents after endoscopic mucosal resection (EMR). However, there are some defects need to be modified. There are some typographical errors in abstract and key words. Moreover, the author's last name is usually cited and the full name is not used. The authors name and sentences will need to be corrected and quoted again. In addition, the author should explain the Figure 1 in the text. The authors need to unify the point on what they want to convey to the readers. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered. (3) Format: There is one figure; (4) References: A total of 5 references are cited, including 4 references published in the last 3 years; Self-cited references: There is 0 self-cited reference. The self-referencing rate should be less than 10%. Please keep the reasonable self-citations (i.e., those which are most closely related to the topic of the
