The following minor issues should be resolved: 1. Abstract: "for metastasis CRC" -> metastatic 2. Abstract: "oncology routine practice" -> routine oncology care (?) 3. Introduction: GLOBOCAN 2020 data just came out recently (DOI 10.3322/caac.21660), I recommend to update the first citation with that. 4. "It is associated with infiltration and immune activation" -> It is associated with lymphocyte infiltration and immune activation 5. TGF-B -> TGF- $\beta$  (?) 6. "and better OS in CM2 (29.0 months), whereas CM3 (18.6 months) and" -> CMS2 and CMS3 7. "...fusion protein with successful results in murine CRC models. This treatment has demonstrated an anti-tumor response by TGF\$\beta\$ and PD-L1 immunosuppressive pathways with successful results in murine CRC models[46,47]." Do not replicate the same information.
