Comment

This article aims to give an overview of Thomas Starzl's life work. It must be acknowledged tho whilst the is entitled a memoriam - he did pass away 4 years ago and some of the language needs to reflect that. Currently, there is too little focus on his successes both scientifically, surgically and in developing the transplant community and this needs to be improved on prior to publication. - Starzl passed away in 2017 so the comment about how Starzl's death deeply saddens all transplant surgeons around the world should be in the past tense (and there is an argument that it is redundant given the passing of this amount of time) - He also worked at the University of Pittsburgh which should be mentioned in the introduction - Whilst it is important to acknowledge Bennie (note two ns) Solis' transplant - it is given too much focus with little mentioned of his successes - the immunosuppression development is vital and needs to be expanded on, it may also be worth discussing his relationship with his surviving patients as well as clinicians around the world (notably Roy Calne) which led to further developments in the field of transplantation. - The special comment is a lovely anecdote which does state a lot for his role in the development of colleagues - it perhaps could be reduced in length
