The authors mentioned the importance of diagnosing and treating cerebrotendinous xanthomatosis at an earlier stage, which will help improve patient outcomes. This case report is novel and of significance to the clinical field, helping recognized by clinicians, leading to early diagnosis and timely treatment. However, the writing of the case report needs further attention, several parts need to improve. The writing structure needs to be further organized and the writing language needs to be further refined. The figures need further arranged and the resolution of the images needs to improve.
