**Comments:** In this study, the authors reported two naval pilots' clinical data of traumatic condition and recovery process with ejection injuries, who had ejected from a failed jet trainer and survived. The cases are very well reported. The authors suggest that the clinicians should pay attention to the pilots' training of ejection and parachuting to significantly reduced ejection injury and improved ejection success rate.
