Although the references are older, only 2 are less than 5 years old, the manuscript is well written and organized, it is important to highlight the possibility of colitis in patients using trientine. In addition to alerting us to possible side effects, the authors emphasize that it is important to be aware of the possibility of Wilson's Disease, which may have varied presentations and can manifest itself at very different ages. But I think that the authors could contribute to clinical practice by discussing a little more about side effects of available treatments for WD.

The incidence of Wilson disease is approximately 1 in 3000 in most ethnic groups. Liver transplantation should be used in patients who have failed medical therapy or who have end-stage decompensated liver disease at diagnosis. This article seems to introduce the adverse reactions of drugs, and has no obvious relationship with whether liver transplantation is performed.
