This can provide readers a good overview of the evidence included in this manuscript. 2. Table 3: Unit of blood sugar & HbA1C should be stated. The different definition of AHA, WHO should be referenced as in Table 2 for consistency. 3. Some typos are noted within the text. Otherwise, this is a well-written manuscript of clinical importance.
