In this regard, those parts of the Discussion where treatment options are handled in detail should be shortened. The authors should evaluate the clinical and imaging features of the case in the light of the literature data. They should investigate whether similar cases with diagnostic dilemma were encountered in the literature and should try to find some clues to overcome the diagnostic challenge.
