The authors describe ten cases of nevus dysmorphia and discuss the diagnostic and therapeutic difficulties of this condition and the importance of a correct psychological approach. The cases are of interest. About some concepts in the discussion, it must be specified whether they are considerations made by the authors of this manuscript or ideas formulated by other authors (in this case, references must be always given). English needs general revision, and particular attention should be paid to the following aspects: -some sentences need to be clarified or rewritten, because they have unclear or no meaning in English; -several verbs have grammar errors, appear improper, or tenses within a sentence are not correctly used; -some abbreviations are not declared at first use ("CBT") or incorrectly written (use "e.g.", not "eg.") -some words, probably because of mistyping, appear totally out of context and the sentences in which they are appear unclear; -punctuation is rarely used in the manuscript, and not always correctly.
