SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The manuscripts gives a good overview of the management of acute pancreatitis. Although there are no original findings presented, it is well-written and covers all relevant aspects of the management of acute pancreatitis. Comments: The term "Clinical Pearls" in the title seems to suggest that the manuscript concerns some rare and



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exclusive circumstances and not the routine care of patients with acute pancreatitis. I would consider another title. The abstract is well-written, although the word limit makes it impossible to give thorough summary of the manuscript. The key words are adequate. The Background is very short but gives a good introduction the paper. The manuscript is well organised and covers most of the important aspects in the management of acute pancreatitis. However, little is mentioned about the need for early admission to intensive care units and how to identify which patients face the risk for multi-organ failure (although this is mentioned briefly in the description of the different scoring systems) The most important references are included in the paper, although many of the references cited are relatively old.
