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Case report: An 83-year-old man previously diagnosed with RPC presented to our clinic with **acute** unilateral chemosis, **conjunctivitis**, lid edema, proptosis, and extraocular muscle restriction. After orbital cellulitis was ruled out, further evaluation revealed **posterior scleritis** with choroidal detachment OS.

In contrast to adult **scleritis**, in paediatric age, it may be painless and presents with mild blurring of vision only.^{1, 2} Associated anterior **scleritis** is seen in only 20% of the cases.¹ Hence it is frequently underdiagnosed. However, it is potentially sight threatening and the treating ophthalmologist must be aware of this entity.

This **case** illustrates that IgG4-RD may **present** initially as a highly steroid-sensitive **posterior scleritis** with the potential to progress to involve multiple ocular tissues simultaneously and bilaterally. Of these, vitreous and choroidal involvements are rarely reported in IgG4-RD but may accompany a severe **posterior scleritis**.
