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Recurrent pyogenic cholangitis is thought to occur in patients suffering from **chronic infestation** of the **biliary tree** by *Clonorchis sinensis* and *Ascaris lumbricoides*, **liver flukes endemic** to Southeast Asia that may obstruct the **intrahepatic biliary ducts** with **resultant bile stasis**, **pigment stone formation** and **bacterial superinfection**.

Recurrent pyogenic cholangitis

Recurrent pyogenic cholangitis, also known as Hong Kong disease, Oriental cholangitis, and Oriental infestational cholangitis, is a chronic infection characterized by recurrent bouts of bacterial cholangitis with primary hepatolithiasis. It is exclusive to people who live or have lived in southeast Asia.

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Recurrent pyogenic cholangitis (RPC) is characte-rized by recurrent **cholangitis attacks**, **dilated bile ducts** and **intrahepatic pigment stones**. 1 Typically its prevalence is high either in natives or immigrants...

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
