TREATMENT Approach to therapy The ideal therapy for hepatorenal syndrome is improvement of liver function from recovery of alcoholic hepatitis, treatment of decompensated hepatitis B with effective antiviral therapy, recovery from acute hepatic failure, or liver transplantation [38-40]. The ability of liver function to improve with abstinence from alcohol and effective antiviral therapy of hepatitis B is remarkable. (See 'Improving hepatic function' below.) However, when improvement of liver function is n...

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Patients with HRS should be evaluated for liver transplantation, at a liver transplant center if possible. This may be more applicable for patients with type 2 HRS, who have a longer survival time, as opposed to patients with type 1 HRS, whose survival is extremely short and who may require alternative therapeutic methods (eg, TIPS, vasoconstrictors) as a bridge to transplantation.
