Can the author show a clinical picture of patient who have improved after Bell's palsy therapy. Can the author explain the etiology of Bell's palsy in patients after the Covid-19 vaccine? Is the pathogenesis the same as other causes of Bell's palsy?. It is better if the author can mention how many patients have Bell's palsy due to the Covid-19 vaccine from the three forms of the covid-19 vaccine. Please also explain the outcome of these patients. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; (3) Format: There are 2 figures; (4) References: A total of 9 references are cited, including 8 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are no self-citations; and (6) References recommendations: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by the peer reviewer(s), especially references published by the peer reviewer(s) him/herself (themselves).
