Peer reviewer raised the following points: 1) "Introduction" could be shortened. 2) What are cut-off values of FPG and/or 2h PPG for the development of T2D from GDM? 3) The authors concluded that both FPG and 2h PPG at diagnosis of GDM can predict future development of T2DM. However, specificity is lacking. 4) Novelty of this manuscript should be clarified because it is well-established that GDM is high risk for T2DM. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; d. The manuscript has 4 tables. It has no figures. e. A total of 40 references are cited, including 14 citations published within the last 3 years. Some citations are too old, published 28-36 years back. There are no self-citations. f. The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by the peer reviewer(s), especially those published by the peer reviewer(s) him/herself (themselves).
