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minireview of the immunotherapy in liver transplantation for hepatocellular carcinoma. The topic is within the scope of the WJGO. (1) Classification: Grade C; (2) Summary of the Peer-Review Report: In this review, the authors comprehensively summarize the available evidence of immunotherapy used in LT that is specific to HCC. Moreover, they discuss clinically concerning issues regarding the concurrent goals of graft protection and antitumor response. However, there are some issues need to be addressed. In the introduction, the author mentioned three immunotherapies, but the introduction of vaccine therapy and adoptive cell transfer (ACT) is insufficient and needs to be supplemented. The title of the paper is "Immunotherapy in liver transplantation for hepatocellular carcinoma: pros and cons", but the conclusion does not highlight the main point of the paper. The questions raised by the reviewers should be answered; and (3) Format: There are 2 tables. (4) References: A total of 82 references are cited, including 33 references published in the last 3 years; (5) Self-cited references: There are no self-cited references; and (6) References recommendations: The authors have the right to refuse to cite improper references recommended by the peer reviewer(s), especially references published by the peer reviewer(s) him/herself (themselves).
