For citations where no author is indicated, a superscript number should be placed at the end of the sentence. Respective examples are: "Mal" reported", "Pan et all ^{2,5} indicated"; "PCR has a high sensitivity ^(6,9) ." No superscript numbers are used when the reference number is described in the text; for example, "The experimental method used has been described in reference [8]."
