Pressure injury is a serious threat to patients' life and health. It increases their medical burden, and can lead to infections and other adverse events. Cerebral infarction is a clinically prominent cerebrovascular disease, and patients need to be bedridden for long periods of time. In this interesting study, the authors explored the value of nursing services based on a multidisciplinary collaborative treatment team in patients with pressure injury wounds following cerebral infarction. The study is very interesting, and the results are reasonable. Comments: 1. A minor language editing is required. Some minor language polishing should be corrected. 2. The manuscript seems to be a case control study, not a retrospective study, please check and revise. 3. The limit of the study should also be discussed.
