#### SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

INTRODUCTION - I think this section should be expanded and, in detail, provide some background information on systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE). - Since the core topic of this case report is a systemic and reticuloendothelial system-related disease in SLE, I think the authors should mention and shortly describe the more usual (even if not frequent) systemic complication (namely macrophage activation syndrome) of rheumatic disorders, including pediatric (Front Med (Lausanne). 2021 Jun 4;8:681875. doi: 10.3389/fmed.2021.681875) and adult lupus (Reumatismo. 2018 Jul 6;70(2):100-105. doi: 10.4081/reumatismo.2018.1023) CASE PRESENTATION - The clinical history (chief complaint, histories) should be merged. - History of present illness should be better organized. Indeed, the diagnostic investigations should be included in a different section and after the description of clinical and anamnestic aspects is completed. - Overall, this section should be re-written in my opinion and should not be so fragmented. - A table with the main laboratory tests (CBC, biochemistry, other) should be added and it may be useful to also follow the longitudinal changes. DISCUSSION - The authors could increase the scientific value of their manuscript with a case-based review. - In the introduction, the authors state: "The first case of MRH with systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE) was reported in 2001. Herein we report a second case of SLE with MRH which is surprising that the patient responded to cyclophosphamide (CTX)." However, I found more cases of MRH in SLE through a quick literature search. I suggest the authors to reconsider that statement and, in general, the discussion in light of this. CONCLUSION - It sounds too strong, considering this is only a case report. A case-based review could also provide more support to the conclusions. REFERENCES -
