COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The authors reported on a case of giant internal jugular venous aneurysm with complicated thrombosis requiring surgical ligation, followed up by a brief literature review. The information provided was sufficient. Based on the clinical history, the venous thrombosis in this case is most likely being induced by the central venous catheterization, which perhaps the authors can raise up this postulation in the discussion to alert the readers. There are however lots of grammatical errors which need to be addressed and corrected. Use of English was extremely poor. Besides, some of the sentences did not make sense or could not be understood which need to be taken care of, for example: “Patients often complain of hoarseness or dysphagia with a choking sensation due to the its anatomical relationship to the vagus nerve within the carotid sheath, however they don’t move with swallowing” “ultrasound with color flow...”



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“vein wall was closed with a running 6-0 prolene...” “the study was not performed during Valsalva or bilaterally as has been recommended”
