The references are to cited according to the style of the journal. You have to clear about the dialytic treatment in the patient's post-operative. The relations between acute pancreatitis and acute hyper-calcemia merit a wider discussion. The patient's CT



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shows signs of acute pancreatitis only at the tail of the pancreas: this excludes obstacles to the Wirsung duct at the head of the gland, as usually happens in biliary pancreatitis. This particular has to be discussed.

The Authors report a case of hypercalcemia induced acute pancreatitis caused by a functioning parathyroid adenoma in 57-year-old man. Some questions for Authors: 1. it would be appropriate to report the reports in Literature regarding the association



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between acute pancreatitis and hyperparathyroidism; 2. In Conclusions to emphasize that in patients with acute pancreatitis it is always wise to exclude a hypercalcemic mechanism, especially when the more common predisposing factors, as biliary stone disease and ethilism, are absent.
